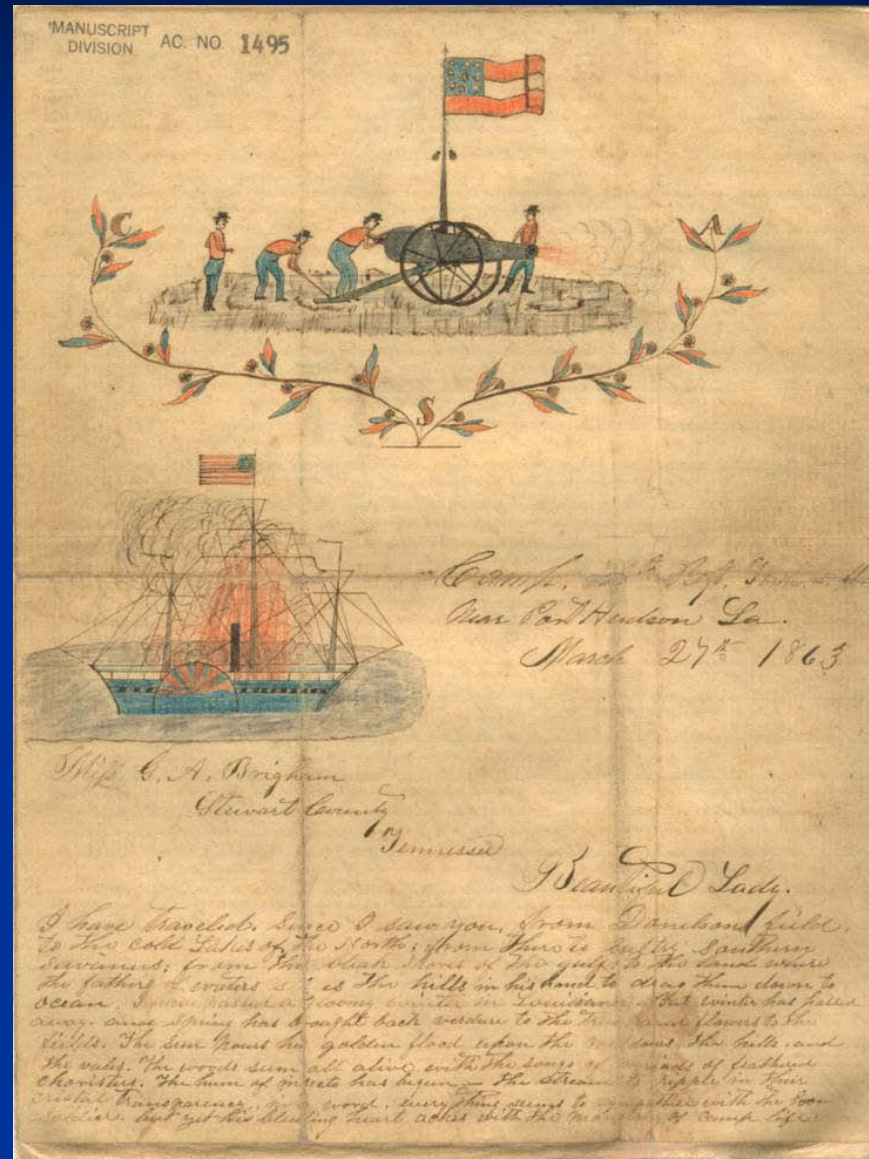




# Map of Civil War military prison

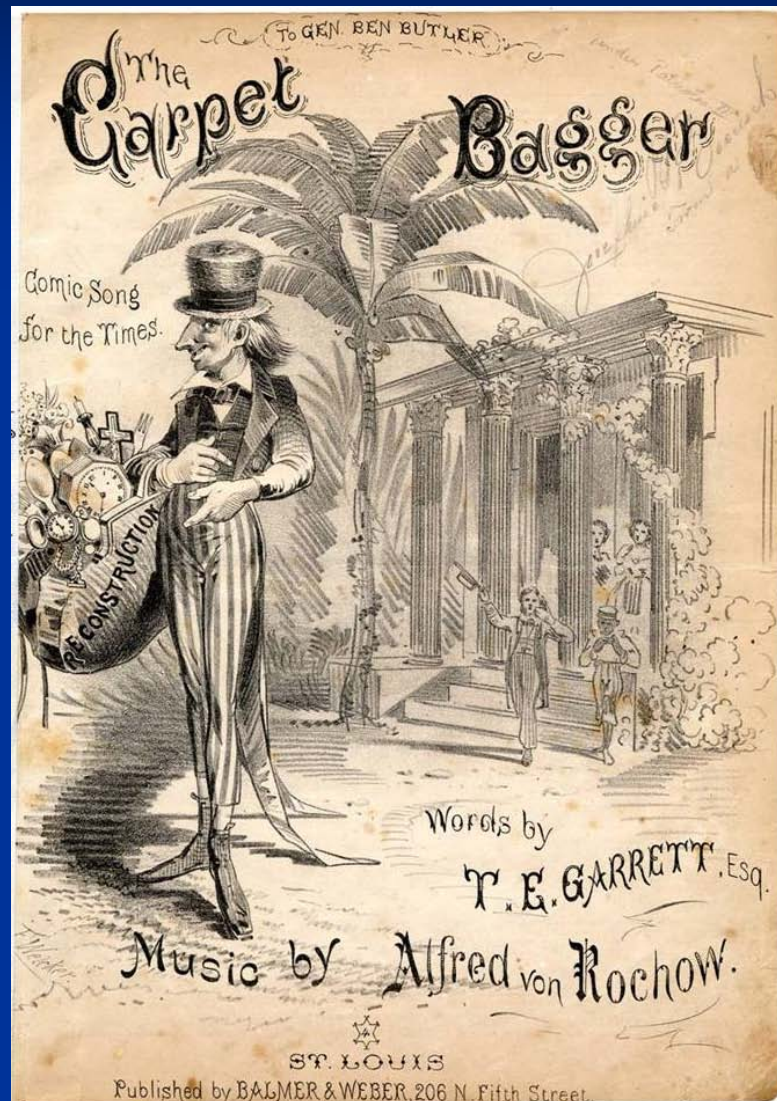

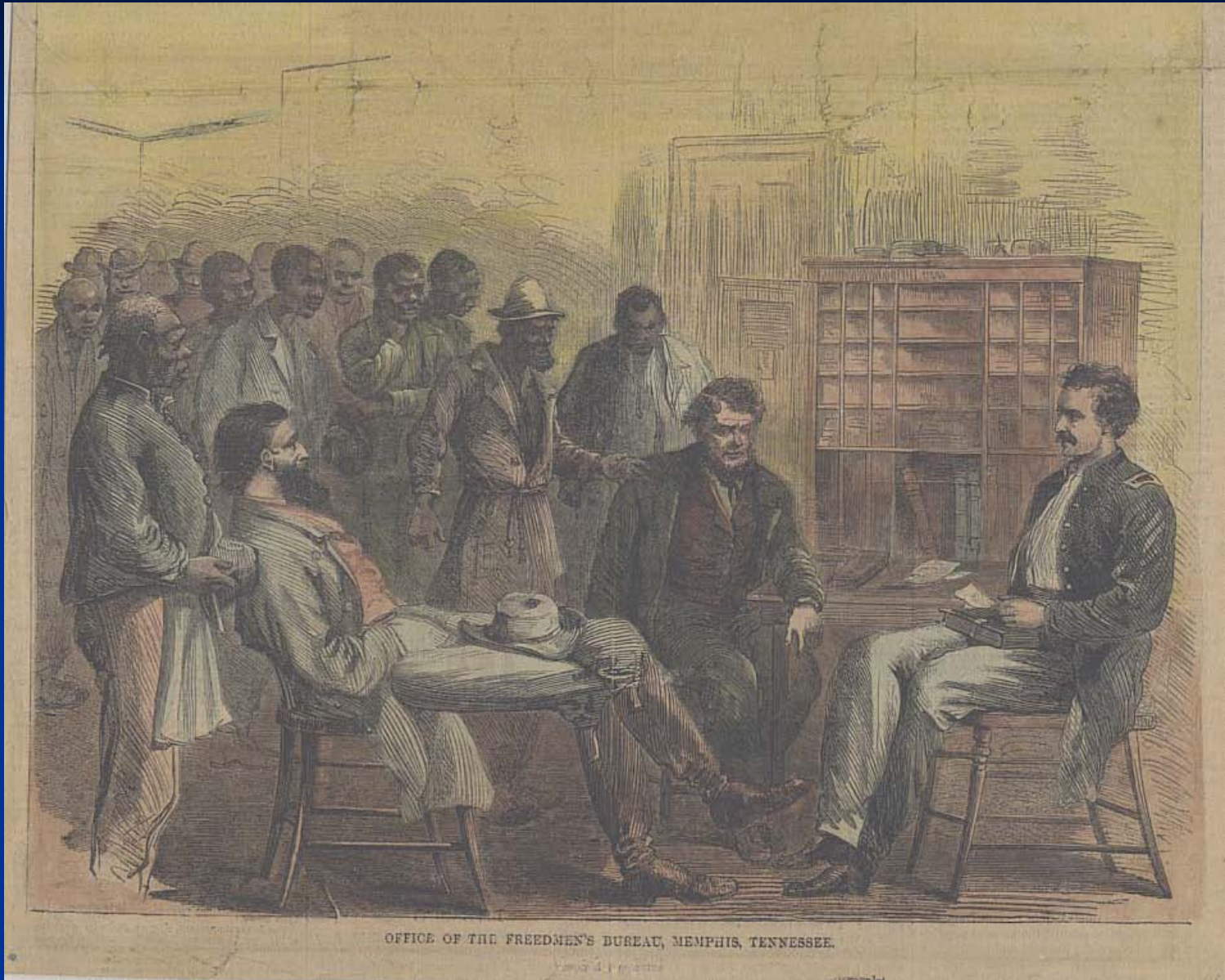




# From Slavery to Sharecropping: Tobacco Labor Contract

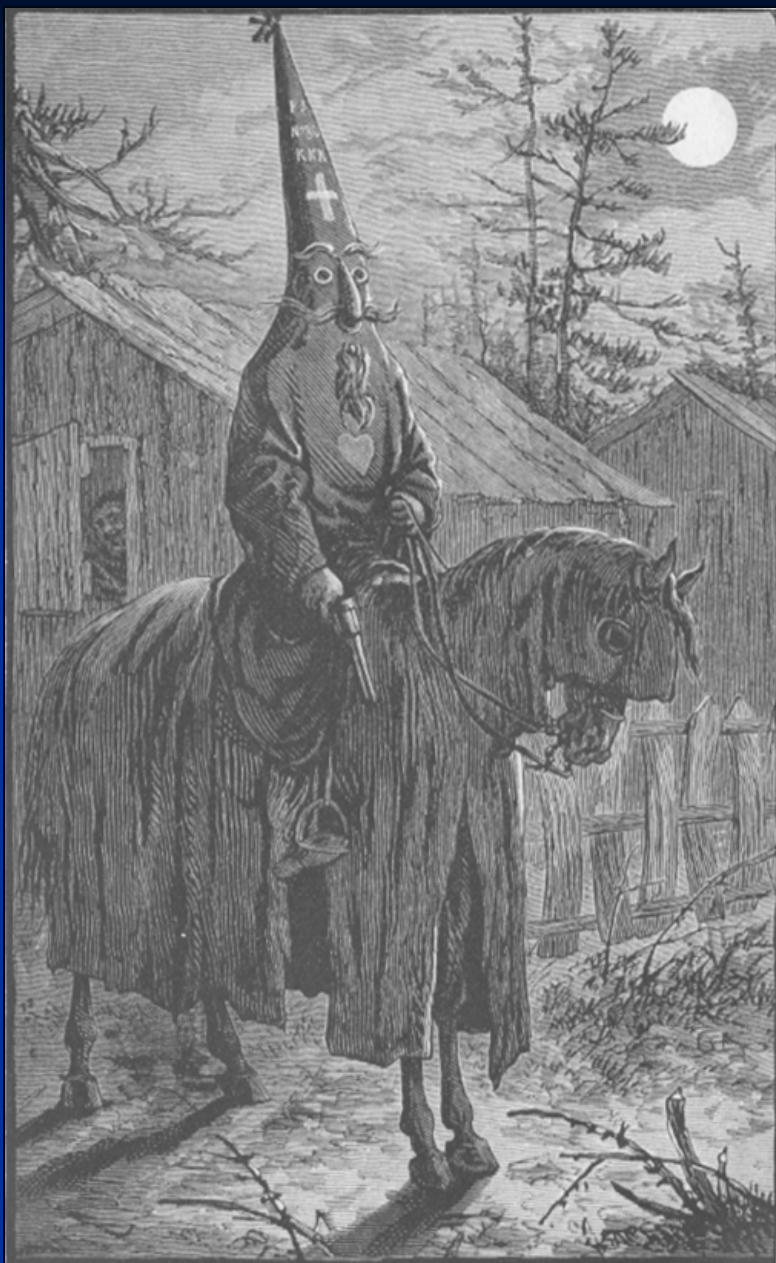
I have this day rented of George Washington  
The Geo Adams House and Society five acres land  
for corn and six acres land for tobacco. The corn  
land I agree to pay six dollars & twenty five cents for  
acre rent. For the tobacco land twelve dollars and  
fifty cents for acre. The corn land is to be cultivated  
in the English Dutch field and the tobacco land in  
the Allegheny run ground. I am entitled to the privilege  
of fire wood & wood for burning Tobacco (prussia)  
head timber or timber that is known down &  
used. But in no case is standing green timber  
to be used for fire wood or burning Tobacco.  
I have seeded wheat on a portion of said  
Washington land for which I am to pay  
three dollars per acre, and if I grow any oats  
I agree to pay three dollars for acre rent for  
oats land. Should I desire it I am authorized  
to increase the tobacco & corn crops by paying  
the same rate as above for acre. But am not  
to use on the quantity without being respon-  
sible for the whole amount.

The Rent for the above premises are due & base in full  
from the day of July 1865 and I bind myself to  
return possession of said premises land the day of  
July 1866.
