My Mother carded wool, spun and wove cloth for the family and also made the clothing, she did the housework with the assistance of her daughters, the washing, knitting, mending, and milking of the cows, she also kept travelers before the railroad was built. 17. Did your parents keep any servants? If so, how many? <u>none</u>, all the family worked

18. How was honest toil-as plowing, hauling and other sorts of honest work of this class-regarded in your community? Was such work considered respectable and honorable? <u>yes by most people, but a few of the more aristocratic</u> Slave holders considered it degrading, yet this was mostly among the women

19. Did the white men in your community generally engage in such work? <u>quite a number did, but possibly</u> not over one-third of the slave holders

He was a member of the Baptist Church, a Mason, a Republican, and several minor offices in Hamblen County, being at one time Tax Assessor He died on the 10th, of January 1922, leaving a widow (who was a third wife) and one son,(the writer of this) together with an estate worth about \$25,000.00
