### **HISTORY OF COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT AT THE TENNESSEE STATE LIBRARY AND ARCHIVES**

The process and intent of collection development at the Tennessee State Library & Archives has evolved over the years, just as the institution and the state-wide community that it serves have also evolved.

The State Library was created in 1854 and at that time consisted almost entirely of materials from other states and from the federal government. The first state librarian appointed was Return Jonathan Meigs, a noted scholar and lawyer. He expanded the library's collection to include books on theology, political science, science, art, and letters. He also continued exchanging documents with other states.

The next significant change in the evolution of the agency occurred in 1919, when John Trotwood Moore was appointed State Librarian and Archivist. He shifted the focus of the materials the library acquired to items that related to the State of Tennessee and its citizens – a focus that continues to this day. He initiated the practice of acquiring Tennessee related materials from the National Archives in Washington, providing a rich foundation of historical documents that has been of benefit to users for over a century. He also added significant items in manuscript, book and periodical formats that reflected local history and Tennessee genealogy, a practice continued not only by his widow and successor, Mary Brown Daniel Moore, but also by every subsequent state librarian.

Shortly after the Library and Archives & Manuscripts sections were combined in 1985, a TSLA Collection Development Committee was formed, consisting of both librarians and archivists. This committee considered potential donations of materials as well as purchases and loans. In 1996, the Collection Management Planning Group decided that TSLA would form separate committees to handle published and unpublished materials. The Archives Review Committee oversees the acquisition of original manuscripts, state agency records, and microfilm of original records. The Collection Development Committee oversees the acquisition of print and published materials

It is clearly an understatement to note that much has changed in the century since the Moores established the Tennessee State Library and Archives as the premier collection of Tennessee materials. Among the numerous challenges facing the institution is the rise of electronic media. Currently, a majority of State and Federal documents collected by the Library are acquired in electronic formats. These electronic formats present new and

unique challenges related to archiving and preservation. The electronic formats common today may be unreadable by the technology of tomorrow. Another great challenge facing the library is the decreasing availability of physical space as the collection has grown. The transition to electronic media, combined with limited space, goes hand-in-hand with a desire to tighten the library's collection scope to more accurately reflect the research needs of its patrons.

TSLA now collects much more than just printed materials and will continue to enrich the collection in a manner that efficiently and effectively satisfies the informational needs of its patrons.

## **STATEMENT OF PURPOSE**

The collection development policy statement serves the following purposes:

- To establish guidelines for staff who are responsible for developing the collections which support the mission of the State Library;
- To help determine which materials are essential and are to be acquired in order to provide consistent and judicious expenditure of public funds;
- To provide clear guidelines to be followed in acquiring and accepting gifts appropriate to the collections; and
- To provide documentation when a selection decision is challenged.

The collection development statement is a working paper reflecting the current needs of the library's users and will be reviewed periodically and revised to reflect changes in those needs.

## **I. Purpose**

### **MANDATE**

The Tennessee State Library and Archives (TSLA) is mandated by the *Tennessee Code Annotated (TCA 10-1-104)* to provide for “the collection and preservation of archival material and materials of historical, documentary and reference value, and such literary works or printed matter as may be considered by the division to be of special interest to the citizenship of Tennessee.”

### **MISSION**

The Tennessee State Library and Archives serves Tennessee government and all its citizens by acquiring, organizing, preserving and making accessible public and historical records and other resources; by providing statewide consultation services in support of public libraries and local archives; and by offering alternative formats for reading for those Tennesseans unable to use standard print material.

### **TSLA AND TENNESSEE CODE ANNOTATED**

TSLA is authorized by TCA 10-1-110 to “cooperate with the National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped of the Library of Congress in planning and conducting a program of bringing free reading materials and related services and other library services to blind and physically handicapped residents of the State.”

## **II. Role of Collection**

### **ACCESS TO THE COLLECTION**

The State Library and Archives’ clientele consists of the citizenship of Tennessee, including government officials and employees, as indicated by law (*Tennessee Code Annotated 10-1-104*, sections 1 and 3). The State Library and Archives provides access and information to non-residents as well, and is open to anyone wishing to use the collection.

Interlibrary loan service is available to eligible patrons. If needed published material or microfilmed material is not held in TSLA’s collection, an attempt will be made to obtain the item from other libraries in the United States. Items borrowed from other libraries cannot be taken from the building. TSLA will also loan selected published and microfilmed materials; patrons needing these materials must make their request through their local library. Materials from the Library collection must be used only in the requesting library, and the term of the loan is not renewable.

### **RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE COLLECTION**

Responsibility for selection is mandated by *Tennessee Code Annotated 10-1-104*, sections 1-3:

“The functions of the management board acting through the division of public libraries and archives shall include specifically the following: (1) the collection and preservation of

archival material and materials of historical, documentary and reference value, and such literary works of printed matter as may be considered by the division of special interest to the citizenship of Tennessee; (2) the distribution and exchange of such publications of the state as may become available from time to time; (3) the collection and distribution of reference material to state officials and employees and such public agencies as may be entitled thereto.”

Also, in accordance with *Tennessee Code Annotated 10-1-102*, “The secretary of state, acting through the state librarian and archivist and the division of public libraries and archives, shall take appropriate action to execute the rules, regulations, policies, and programs adopted by the management board.”

Librarians and archivists are responsible for recommending appropriate items for the collections. Subject specialists have primary responsibility for sections of the collection and accept recommendations from any staff member or patron for consideration. The areas of collection are further defined in Section IV and then fully defined in Appendix 1.

### **III. Scope of the Collection**

This policy covers only those published materials which the library acquires for its research collection; it does not cover the policies governing the acquisition of archival materials. This policy does not cover materials considered archival in nature. Archival materials are governed by the Archives Review committee.

### **LEVELS OF COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT**

TSLA will acquire new materials and retrospectively develop collections with a focus on Tennesseana. The conspectus approach is used for collection evaluation and analysis for the library collection held within the Tennessee State Library and Archives.

According to the *Guide for Written Collection Policy Statements*, second edition, published by the American Library Association, the conspectus approach to collection evaluation and description is a standardized process involving Library of Congress Classification and Library of Congress subject headings. Each classification (i.e. G classification for geography) is evaluated number by number and given a rank of collection codes ranging from O, out of scope, to 5, comprehensive level. More detailed explanation of each level is available in Appendix 1.

### **SELECTION OF MATERIALS**

Criteria for purchase include:

- Published works about Tennessee and Tennesseans and works of local history valuable to historical and genealogical research are acquired comprehensively.
- Published works about Kentucky, North and South Carolina, Virginia, Alabama, Mississippi, and Georgia local history are acquired selectively at the research level.
- Indexed works will be chosen over non-indexed works, if possible.

In general, the State Library and Archives' highest priority is the collection of material about Tennessee. Materials valuable to historical research in the Southeastern states are acquired, as well as standard and important works in American history and biography, standard reference works, works by Tennessee authors, professional materials, and other, more specialized materials as needed.

The Library's role as an information center for state officials allows it to collect federal documents, reference works on the federal government, and material from other states.

The State Library and Archives is a depository for Tennessee government documents, generally collecting two copies of each document. As a selective federal document depository, the State Library and Archives selects Item Numbers which support the general collection and professional needs of State Library and Archives staff.

## **FORMATS COLLECTED**

In order to meet the information needs of all Tennesseans, the State Library and Archives collects archival and manuscript materials in their original form, when available, as well as other print and non-print materials (monographs; government documents; state, county, and local history records; periodicals; newspapers; microforms; maps, electronic works, etc).

Other formats, such as print, microform, compact discs, or digital images of items, may be retained as appropriate for preservation and access.

TSLA does not have a program for reformatting commercially available or privately created disk, tape or film formats. There may be items in the collection for which there is no equipment to make useable.

In addition, the TSLA houses the TN LBPH collection of popular materials in formats that are designed specifically for persons who are unable to read standards print. For example, audio, Braille, descriptive video and large print are collected by LBPH.

## **WEEDING OF COLLECTION**

Deaccessioning, or weeding, is the active discarding, or surplussing, of unneeded items. Publications that do not support the mission of TSLA and do not fall under the collection development policy are removed in order to maintain a cohesive, useful, and well kept collection. An active and continuous weeding program is essential in order to keep certain materials viable and useful. Where selectors are responsible for specific areas or formats, they are also responsible for weeding those areas.

Federal depository documents are considered property of the U.S. Government. TSLA must comply with established federal regulations and agreements with the Tennessee FDLP regional library at the University of Memphis to withdraw any deposited FDLP

materials. These requirements are detailed in the *Federal Depository Library Handbook* and “Procedures for Withdrawal of U.S. Government Depository Publications.”

All Tennesseana and all Tennessee state documents are held in perpetuity.

## IV. Collection Guidelines

**Policies by Subject in Brief. The following topics are the area of concentration in which the Tennessee State Library and Archives collects materials. For more information about detailed levels of the collection, see Appendix 1.**

### A. Standard Works of Reference

Standard works of reference are collected primarily in print form; however, various types of formats are considered. The Tennessee State Library and Archives evaluates resources and purchases formats that best meet the needs of the Tennessee State Library and Archives and its patrons. The reference collection includes, but is not limited to, encyclopedias, dictionaries, and indexes, newspapers, periodicals, directories, bibliographies, statistical works and online databases.

With respect to reference works pertaining to Tennessee, the goal of the Tennessee State Library and Archives is to collect these materials at the *COMPREHENSIVE* level.

Non-Tennessee genealogical reference tools (bibliographies, census indexes, periodical indexes, and guidebooks) for certain geographic areas are collected at the *RESEARCH* level. These genealogical reference tools will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis.

### B. Tennesseana

State and local history, transcribed records, biographies of Tennesseans, of or about Tennesseans. ---*COMPREHENSIVE*

### C. Works on Southeastern United States

Works on the history and culture of the southeastern United States, including local history materials on states contiguous to Tennessee.—*RESEARCH LEVEL*

### D. Works on States Outside the Southeastern United States

Works on the history and culture of states other than those in the southeastern United States are collected at the *STUDY OR INSTRUCTIONAL SUPPORT LEVEL*. Local histories for states outside of the southeastern United States are not collected.

### E. American History and Biography

Materials of perceived lasting importance on American history and biography.—  
*ADVANCE STUDY OR INSTRUCTIONAL SUPPORT LEVEL*

F. Genealogy

Family genealogies are collected, but in general, not purchased.

G. Law—Other States—Minimal Tennessee and federal statutory laws are collected at the *COMPREHENSIVE LEVEL* (with most federal material received as depository material).

H. Professional Materials

The Tennessee State Library and Archives collects resources required to assist librarians and archivists in carrying out their professional duties at a research level. These materials are acquired to improve the knowledge, skills and abilities of librarians and archivists in the professional setting. Resources that contain new information and analysis are collected for professional development, research, public and library programs, exhibits, and other career related purposes.

I. Materials for the Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped.

Braille titles and the majority of the audio titles are selected by the professional staff of the National Library Services for the Blind and Physically Handicapped/Library of Congress, based on their appeal to people with a wide variety of interests, including best sellers, biographies, fiction and how-to books. In addition, there are a limited number of titles in Spanish and as well as other Romance and Slavic languages. In addition, titles of local interest, such as Tennesseana and Southeastern U.S. materials are collected, when available in alternate formats. These titles are recorded by LBPHs in other states and by the Radio Reading Service, housed within Nashville Public Library. Fiction and non-fiction large print and descriptive video titles are also collected based on popular interest and availability. The last two formats are selected by staff of the TN LBPH and paid for using Tennessee funds, unlike the audio and Braille collections, which are provided by the NLS/LC.

J. Federal Documents

The collection development policy for Federal Depository Library Program (FDLP) materials is guided by the tenants of this document and supplemented by information contained in TSLA's "Federal Depository Library Collection Development Policy. Please reference this document for all FDLP collection development concerns

K. State Documents

The State Library at Nashville, the library of the University of Tennessee at Knoxville, the Cossitt Library at the University of Memphis, and such other libraries which the Governor may name by executive order, are designated depositories for state documents and for all publications issued by any official of the state. Collected at the *COMPREHENSIVE* level.

L. Standards for Fiction Selection – *MINIMAL LEVEL*

Strong consideration should be given to the following criteria:

1. Recommendation in standard or Tennessee-related book review journals, history journals, bibliographies, or other highly regarded critical sources or individuals.
2. Reputation and/or authority of author, editor, or illustrator
3. Literary merit, originality, and authority.
4. Contemporary significance or permanent value
5. Tennessee connection – Author:
  - a. Author/editor must have lived in Tennessee for at least 5 years.
  - b. Author/editor must have produced a considerable body of writing, if not all, books while living in Tennessee
6. Tennessee background, theme, or other connection:
  - a. Fiction should be set predominantly in Tennessee, where the setting contributes significantly to the written representation of the state.
  - b. Other fiction may be considered if it illuminates events that took place in Tennessee or that are common to the Southern states. (*For example, slave stories can provide a deeper understanding of Tennessee history during the period of slavery, even if not set wholly within the state.*)
7. Relation to existing collection and to other materials on the subject.
8. Availability of the book in other area libraries and/or through Inter-Library Loan.
9. Price and availability.
10. Writing in certain popular genres (e.g., mysteries, romances, family sagas, horror, Westerns, and movie tie-ins) will not be collected unless the title has received significant critical attention, or unless the book meets other criteria listed above.
11. Fiction, which should be written primarily in English, must support the mission of the Tennessee State Library and Archives

M. Publications of Tennessee colleges and universities

As a rule, the publications of individual colleges and universities will not be collected. These institutions are responsible for the maintenance of and access to their respective publications.

N. Works by Tennessee authors (persons either born in or having strong Tennessee connections) – *STUDY OR INSTRUCTIONAL SUPPORT LEVEL*.

Collection Levels and Descriptions		
<b>0</b>	<b>Out of Scope</b>	The library does not collect in this subject.
<b>1</b>	<b>Minimal Level</b>	Few selections are made beyond very basic works. The collection should be reviewed for currency
<b>2</b>	<b>Basic Information Level</b>	A selective collection that introduces and defines a subject; it also suggests further sources of information.
<b>3</b>	<b>Study or Instructional Support Level</b>	The collection includes a wide range of basic and retrospective materials, as well as works from significant and secondary writers. It supports independent study and most learning needs of public library clientele.
<b>4</b>	<b>Research Level</b>	The collection includes materials to support high-level original research.
<b>5</b>	<b>Comprehensive Level</b>	The library's aim is to collect all significant works in all applicable languages for this field.
